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
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

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History of the Billy Bowlegs Festival
















The Billy Bowlegs Festival, now in its 4th year as a Jaycee sponsored event, got its start as a water ski show on Labor

Day sponsored by the City Recreation Department. It was crowd pleaser, but the city decided it was too large for them to handle so they asked the Jaycees, then in their first year as an organization, to take it over. The Jaycees, after a lot of research and planning meetings, agreed to sponser the event. Wayne Bell was president and appointed Bruce. Ranew and Bob Bryant as co-chairmen. The event that year consisted of a parade, fish fry, ski show and dance at the community Center. Jaycee membership at that time was seventeen.


The event became so popular that the following year the Jaycees decided to follow a pirate theme and name it after the infamous pirate, Billy Bowlegs, whose base of operations was the area waters. Beards were grown and soon the townspeople began to get the festival fever. Sewing shops were swamped with orders for exotic costumes and mothers and wives spent their days designing and making same. The boat to be used for the pirate landing (since it had been decided to let the pirate crew invade by water) was late in arriving and Monday morning at the yacht club was a scene of feverish activity. All Went well, however, and Monday night found many or the Jaycees much too tired to even attend the gaily decorated dance that was held. Thousands of local people and visitors alike enjoyed a fun-filled day and went home vowing to return again next year. Lt. Richard Nichols was president of the Jaycees and a few of the Jaycees who worked day and night to insure its success were Bob Markham, Jim Kendrick, Harry Buchanan, Basil Boles, Bruce Ranew, Jerry Melvin, Ray Currance, and many others. Bob Bryant was chairman that year and Nathan Fleet was the first "Billy Bowlegs".

Due to the growing popularity of the festival, the Jaycees decided to make a three day affair of the event for 1956 and called on the city fathers for help. They responded whole-heartedly and \$2800.00 was raised in one night. Events were added such as treasure hunts for the childern, Junior Bowlegs Ball for the Youngsters, two parades, bigger and more elaborate pirate landing, burning of the Fort, plus a gigantic fire-works display on Monday night. Beards were again grown, the town was gaily decorated and three days of festivities ensued. By far the biggest yet and, again, the Jaycees, after months of planning and preparation, had a success. Bob Bryant was president, Basil Boles was chairman, and practically the entire 30 man membership worked long and hard. Roger Clary was Billy Bowlegs for 1956.

This year the Jaycees are staging, to the best of their knowledge, the biggest single event for Labor Day any place in the country. With the help of such wonderful arganizations as the "Krewe of Bowlegs", City Council and County Commissioners, plus the fine cooperation from Eglin AFB, they have increased their operating budget to approximately \$25,000.00. Basil Boles and Bob Bryant are co-chairmen of the festival and they und their committees have worked long and hard with one thought in mind. From Saturday P.M. when "Billy" and his pirate crew sail up the sound to take over the city and declare three days of fun and frolic until Monday night when the last pirate has slipped back aboard his own individual "ship" and the festival officially comes to a close, they wish you one and all a very wonderful time and ask that you come again next year when they can once again be your host for The "Billy Bowlegs Festival."



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The bay country of Okaloosa is truly a playground with the "World's Whitest Sand Beaches", the beautiful and colorful translucent gulf water, and the comfortable temperate climate. In fact, the area enjoys one of the cooler climates on the Gulf Coast with less than 100 hours of 85 degree or higher temperature during the summer months. Also of importance to many is the fact that our area has one of the lowest pollen counts in the country.

The visitor or new resident will find many fine recreational facilities and shops to add to the enjoyment of their stay.

The area is a true paradise for the sportsman with our gulf and bay waters abundant in all varieties of fish. Destin is nationally famous for her Snapper catches. Eglin Reservation has one of the largest deer population in the South and thousands of deer are killed each year during season. Turkey, quail, dove and geese are also hunted. Water skiing, sailing, and boating offer the visitor many hours of sport and pleasure.

Of major importance to the Playground Area is Eglin AFB, the world's largest air force base. The Chamber appreciates the economic part the base has played in helping to develop "The Miracle Strip".

The Playground Chamber of Commerce is proud of the role it has had in the growth and development of the area and still continue its work through its assistance to you.

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Back in 1953 a ski show was planned to give the local residents and tourists something to enjoy over the Labor Day weekend. The ski show was such a success that in 1954 the Bowle 1954 the Bowlegs Festival was built around it. Each Labor Day since, hundreds of spectators enjoying the Billy Bowlegs Festival have gathered to see the show. It has grown from a few acts to 161 big acts featuring some of the best talent in the South, This year's show will include the Aqua Maids consisting of 6 beautiful girls performing the water ballet: ski jumping by Allen Warriner, Sonny Neighbors, Joe O'Hare and Bob Nathey: doubles by Carolyn Sirmon and Joe O'Hare: barefoot skiing by Bob Nathey: pyramids, shoe skiers, clowns and many other spectacular acts. There will be 20 water skiers in the show, headlined by Bob Nathey who formerly skied at Cypress Gardens and the worlds held umping record of 90 feet in 1953. With such talent this 1953. years ski show is shaping up to be the largest water ski carnival ever presented in this grea.







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Within days, Southern Airways will inaugurate daily airline service to the Playground Area. 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

Valparaiso

Niceville, the oldest settlement in the Playground Area, was given its name by the U.S. Post Office Department during the late 1800's and descendents of many of the pioneer families still reside in the area.

Situated on the shores of Boggy Bayou the community was called Boggy for many years. In 1895 Postmaster General William E. Wilson commissioned B. Pomeroy Edge Postmaster and requested that names be forwarded to Washington for consideration by the postal department. Among names submitted for the Post Office were Oakville, Edgewater and Niceville. The latter was chosen by the postal authorities and has remained to the present time.

Shortly after the Civil War several families from Georgia, Alabama, and the area around De Funiak Springs discoveder the bayous off Choctawhatchee Bay and settled here, each homesteading 160 acres of land.

Among these early settlers were the Parrishes, Edges,

Allens, Sanders, Kings, Marlers, and Nathey's.

The economy of the area at that time was based on

Cattle, Farming and shipbuilding. Later sawmilling and

naval stores operations became important factors in the growth of the community. In the absence of currency. silver dollars were numerous as legal tender.

Some of the largest freight boats that plied the local waters were built in the Parrish Shipyard under supervision of George Parrish, father of James Parrish, who still continues the work his father founded.

Tom's Bayou near Valparaiso was named for an early settler, Tom King, who is buried in Tom's Cemetery on its shore.

Long known for the longevity of its citizen's, it is

Long known for the longevity of its citizen's, it is reported that Joe Allen, great grandfather of Joe and Lula Edge, lived to be 104 years old.

In 1900 the U.S. Forest Service created the Choctawhatchee National Forest, which is now the Eglin Air Force Base Reservation, and sent E.R. McKee into the area as forest ranger and W.F. Hill as forest supervisor. Originally Niceville was located in Walton County,

The City of Valparaiso is primarily a city of homes

The City of Valparaiso is primarily a city of homes without the usual industrial or manufacturing activities common to most cities. It was founded in 1918, incorporated as a city in 1921, and has continued to grow with the other cities of the Playground Area until it now has a population of 6,960 and has some twenty or more homes under construction at this time.

The name Valparaiso was selected by the founder, John B. Perrin, who saw in the location what he called the "Vale of Paradiss" which in Spanish is called "Valparaiso". It is truly such a place, lying as it does on the waters of Choctawhatchee Bay only eight Miles airline from the Gulf of Mexico. The city proper is surrounded by water on three sides: by Sunset Bayou (Tom's) on the south. Valparaiso Bay (Boggy Reyou)

surrounded by water on three sides: by sunset Bayou (Tom's) on the south, Valparaico Bay (Boggy Bayou) on the east and north and benefits from the breezes from across the water during the hot seasons.

The city has the usual stores, churches, filling stations, garages needed for the populance, one theater, and soon will have a school of its own. In the mean-time, the children of the city attend school in the adjacent city of Niceville by buses provided by the county. The city is incorporated for an area of six miles in ty. The city is incorporated for an area of six miles in length and about three miles in width and includes the main field of Eglin Air Force Base within its limits. Valparaiso Landing Field (a municipal airport) became the Valparaiso are either stationed at Eglin in the Air Force or are employed there as civilians.

Niceville continued

Florida. In 1915 by a special act of the Florida Legislature, Santa Rosa and Walton Counties were divided and a new county, Okaloosa, was created.

Today Niceville is the home of many civilian and mili-

tary personnel. Numerous shops and stores are found in the

area and the town boasts of the Spence Brothers Fish Company which is fourth largest of its kind in the entire state. The Bay Lumber Company proc-esses many feet of pine lumber daily, Churches of many faiths and two schools are located in Niceville and the town operates under a City Manager form of Government.

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Eglin Air Force Base is the home of the Air Proving Ground Command and Air Force Armament Center, a sub-command of the Air Research and Development Command. The Eglin Reservation comprises 800 square miles or 465,000 acres. It represents an investment of approximately one-half billion dollars which does not include land

At the present time, there are about 12,000 military and 4,000 civilian personnel employed at Eglin, with an annual payroll of around \$4,000,000 a year. Much of this money is spent in Fort Walton Beach and other towns in Okaloosa County.

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
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
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BILLY BOWLEGS

Everybody loves to dress up once in a while -- dress up in something really unusual. That's why the Billy Bowlegs Costume Ball has been such a success through the years. Last year so many folks attended the one costume ball that three have been planned for this year. The first annual Krewe of Bowlegs Ball will be held Friday night at the Shalimar Club. This strictly invitational affair is sponsored by the Krewe of Bowlegs, a group of local business and professional men. Cap'n Billy will appear at the Krewe of Bowlegs Ball, still masked. His true identity will not be revealed until the Jaycee-Sponsored Captive Queen Ball Saturday night. The Captive Queen Ball, to be held at the Tower Beach Casino, Will see the unmasking of Billy and the selection of a Captive Queen. The Orchestra of Johnny Long will provide music for both events.

Also, on Saturday night the Junior Billy Bowlegs Ball will be held at the Fort Walton Beach Community Center. At the Junior Ball a teen-age Bowlegs and teen-age captive queens will be selected. Popular Rock 'n Roll recording artists, the Four Mints, will appear at the Junior Billy Bowlegs Ball.

So much for the organized costume balls. Everyone will be encouraged to wear pirate costumes during the entire three days of the festival -- to their private parties, in their places of business -- even on the street.







The Krewe of Bowlegs

Although the Krewe of Bowlegs, in actuality is a fledgling mystic order functioning under charter rules and regulations, there's nothing occult in the minds of Pleyground residents and businessmen concerning its present and patential value as a lafty social contribution and an invaluable publicity

potential value as a lofty social contribution and an invaluable position, target.

The Krewe, currently active in its second year, is a direct and brilliantly promising multiple of the Billy Bowlegs Festival. This Labor Day celebration, an infant itself - three years to be exact, is the brain child and annually sponsored event of the Fort Walton Beach Junior Chamber of Commerce. This group of enterprising young businessmen eager to latch onto a project that would warrant their time and efforts, conceived the idea of a Gasparilla-type observance centered on a Billy Bowlegs theme, Bowlegs being a pirate of controversial authenticity whose alleged activities were widely spread throughout the Playground Area.

The overwhelming acceptance and ensuing success of the initial celebration sparked vigourous local interest and resulted in some extremely cratifying publicity beyond its intended boundaries. The second year, armed

gratifying publicity beyond its intended boundaries. The second year, armed with impressive results of their labors and an intense desire to broaden their scope, the Jaycees successfully appealed to city fathers and merchants to underwrite the cost of the Billy Bowlegs celebration. Meanwhile, and cognizent of Pensacola's success with a like group of influential businessmen comprising the Krewe of LaFittie the Krewe of Bowlegs was canceived and born of a small group of area merchants of which two, together with two from Jaycees, were secretly delegated to chaose from the member list the Billy Bowlegs, a reigning pirate of the three day fiesta whose identity remained unknown until the unmasking ceremonies took place on the evening of the grand ball which highlighted the festival activities. The first such honor under organized and recognized jurisdiction went to Roger Clary, a civic-minded businessman and then Chamber of Commerce President.

Last year's success provided a blue print and the necessary inspiration for the improvement and impressive growth of this year's Krewe of Bowlegs. for the improvement and impressive growth of this year's Krewe of Bowlegs. Now safely chartered and broadened to encompass eligible members from Crestview and other surrounding county communities, the membership and associate membership contains roughly 85 men whose membership dues have solved the vitally important problem of festival independance. The gaily-clad, carefree Krewe of Bowlegs affords insight to a colorful and more prosperous Labor Day observance for the Playgraund.

The Krewe of Bowlegs is an organization governed by a President, Vice-President and Board of Directors who meet at regular intervals to disjust policies, procedures and the general walfare of the group. This governing body is composed of prominent citizens and Krewe members whose businesses help form the foundation of the city and county's economical stabilization and are therefore invaluable as fastival supparters.

Visitors to and citizens of the Playground Area are in for three days of unprecedented fun and frolic during this year's Billy Bowlegs celebration with the spollight of pompous ceremony focused on the Krewe's participation. A sizeable sum has been spent on gaily-colored costumes to be worn by the Krewe during their parade and at the Ball which follows that night. The artistic abilities of local talent has created some of the most beautiful and impressive parade floats, on which the Krewe will ride, ever

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Gulfarium Story

The Gulfarium, also known as the "Living Sea," located on Santa Rosa Island, between Fort Walton Beach and Destin, in the heart of Northwest Floridg's famed "Miracle Strip," was opened during August 1955 and gained immediate acceptance by the public as one of Florida's major attractions.

Fronting on U.S. Highway 98, the Gulfarium's background is the colorful Gulf of Mexico

edged by the whitest sand beaches in the World. Its strategic location on the coastal route, midway between New Orleans and Tallahassee, in nearest Florida to most of the Nation, makes a Gulfarium visit a "must" not only for vacationists and residents in the Pensacola - Panama City area but for thousands upon thousands of transient tourists enroute to other famed resort areas.

The Main Tank holds a half-million gallons of constantly circu-



lating sea water and is equipped with an observation deck for viewing performsurface and scores of portholes through which, in complete safety, you will theilling witness underwater shows. The unique reef containing tank 60,000 gallons of salt water is equipped with a huge

picture-window which permits a wide-angle view of teeming marine life. These huge tanks provide the settings for the two distinctly different performances which you witness for a single admission.

Between scheduled performances, you can letsurely examine the living exhibits housedin the many smaller Aquaria, visit the Snack Bar and Free Shell Exhibit, or browse around in the Gift Shop.

Surface shows staged in the Main Tank are viewed from the Observation Deck which completely encircles the top of the giant tank. From this elevation you will also obtain an awe-inspiring view of the Gulf of Mexico and "The Whitest Sand Beach in the World."

Underwater shows in the Main Tank may be observed from either the lower deck or middle deck both of which are completely enclosed to permit better viewing through the many portholes and to provide sheltered observation positions during infrequent periods of inclement weather.

MAN FIRST ENJOYED PLAYGROUND BEACHES IN 4000 B.C.

Even before the down of recorded history, people enjoyed the blue skies and white sand beaches of the Playground Area. Evidence which has come to light recently shows that a relatively cultured pre-historic people lived here around 2,000 B.C.

The evidence consists of several manmade clay balls or spheroids about the size and shape of a peach. Professional archealogists have called the objects typical of the so-called "Poverty Point" civilization which existed along the banks of the Mississippi River at about the same time.

The spheroids, uncovered at Elliott's Point and in the Chactawmar area, were used by the pre-historic inhabitants in a variety of ways, chief among them cooking. The housewife of 4,000 years ago, not being able to switch on on automatic range, dug a hole, lined it with animal skin, then filled it with water and food and tossed in the pre-heated spheroids to supply the heat.



On the first day of the 1956 Billy Bowlegs Festival, two weary, sun-burned skiers pulled to the beach of the Playground Area after a grueling 255 mile trip from New Orleans. Ten and one-half hours earlier the two skiers, Bab Nathy and Allen Warriner, had been confident that they would break the world's distance open water record. The first half of the trip went as scheduled but improper bindings on the ski's and rough water soon started to hamper the skiers. Although they did not break the record last year, Bob Nathy and Allen Warriner have been in training this year with a pair of skiis specially built for distance skiing. Instead of regular ski bindings, tennis shoes were used and a thin metal fin on the bottom replaced the conventional wooden runner. With proper equiment and the experience obtained last year, the boys will be all out to better the worlds record by about 15 miles This year the skiers will start in lake Ponchartrain above New Orleans, circle the lake to obtain mileage and then on to Fort Walton Beach 420 miles away. The skiers will enter the water at Day-break August 31st and are scheduled to arrive in Fort Walton Beach 400 p. m. the same day.






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

DESTIN FISHING RODEO

The Destin-Gulf Coast Deep Sea Fishing Rodeo is staged annually during the entire month of October and, last year, attracted anglers from more than half of the nation.

The Rodeo to be staged this October is the ninth tournament and, through the years, the event has evolved into one which two distinct types of fisher men can compete on even terms for the Grand Prize.

Playground Areas offshore waters have long been famed for their unexcelled bottom-fishing with the Red Snapper the choice species sought by this method but in recent years trolling activities have been greatly accelerated in the area with King Mackerel, as two top specimens caught locally, vary greatly in length and contour but their weight range is nearly identical. This natural situation per-

mits the featuring of King Mackerel and Red Snapper in the Rodeo's Grand Prize competition, thus giving bottom fishermen and trollers an even chance at the top money as the winning fish is determined by weight. A large consolation prize for the largest fish entered in the losing species teeps the Grand Prize competition keen throughout the

There is a Major Award in the Largest Edible Fish Cat-

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egory which division is judged separately and is is in this Major Award Division that the Monster Warsaw and Jewfish are entered.

Pier, bridge, and fishermen also have an opportunity to compete in the contest with the Pompano the featured fish for Principal Prize in this division.

Daily prizes are awarded in all three divisions of the Rodeo

and last year's prize list, including the Grand Prize, consolation Prize, Major Award, and Principal Prize, exceeded \$5,000 in value.


