




HISTORY of the »»

BILLY BOWLEGS FESTIVAL, now in its 34th year, got its start as a water ski show on Labor Day sponsored by the City Recreation Department. It was a crowd pleaser! ... but the city decided it was too large for them to handle so they asked the Jaycees, then in their first year as an organization, to take it over. The Jaycees, after a lot of research and planning meetings, agreed to sponsor the event. The event that year consisted of a parade, a fish fry, ski show and dance at the Community Center. (Incidentally, the Jaycee membership at that time was only seventeen!) The idea of a Gasparilla-type observance centered on a pirate theme, and they were unanimous in their choice of the notorious and legendary WILLIAM AUGUSTUS BOWLES as their patron pirate ... a pirate of controversial authenticity whose alleged, dastardly deeds were widespread throughout what is now known as the PLAY-GROUND AREA or the EMERALD COAST.

After the overwhelming success of this initial celebration, a small group of merchants, together with the JAYCEES, were secretly delegated to choose from its membership a Cap'n Billy Bowlegs as reigning pirate of the then three-day festival. His identity would remain a mystery until the unmasking ceremonies took place on the evening of the grand ball. The late NATHAN FLEET, a downtown retail merchant at that time, was chosen as the first Cap'n Billy Bowlegs to reign over the festival and lead the pirate raids. He played his role so well, he was asked again the following year to lead the pirate Krewe! (His son, Judge Erwin Fleet, following in his father's footsteps, was Cap'n Billy Bowlegs XIV in 1968-69).

During the festival, races are held, tournaments played, arts and crafts displayed, frisbees thrown, boats paraded, bands play, square dancers kick up their heels, the small fry fish and the gaily costumed pirates' Krewe lands again on the beautiful white sands of Northwest Florida. The city is duly "captured" and the Jolly Roger is hoisted to signify the total surrender of the city! There is fun for the entire family, with treasure hunts for the children as well as for grownups ... and a treasure map to help with the search. Over the years, more and more professional floats have been added to the Grand Torchlight Parade and a glittering Coronation Pageant (open to the public at no charge) is held at which a new Captain Billy Bowlegs, his Queen, a First Mate and his lady, ten Honor Guard couples and children of the court are un-The Coronation Pageant is followed by a masked and introduced. private ball and midnight buffet for Krewe members and their honored guests. Thus a tradition was born: the BILLY BOWLEGS FESTIVAL, with the infamous KREWE OF BOWLEGS and reigning Cap'n Billy as the "star" of the show!


An early souvenir program and guide (1957) lists 75 Krewe members: six of these are still members ... and into a second generation of pirates as several sons of original Krewe members are now carrying on a tradition started by their fathers. ROGER CLARY was the first Cap'n Billy under organized charter. Current Krewe membership is 170, plus former Cap'n Billys who automatically become members of the SOCIETY OF BOWLEGS, affectionately known as the SOB's! Membership in the Krewe is limited by the Constitution & By-Laws of the Krewe and there is always a waiting list. Hours of volunteered time and talent, plus sizeable sums of money are expended each year by Krewe members and their wives on colorful floats, beautiful decorations and custom-made costumes worn by the Krewe during the parade, pageant and ball. The "theme" floats which the masked Krewe ride allow the members to throw showers of souvenir trinkets and "gold" doubloons to the thousands lining the parade route. ALL KREWE EVENTS ARE PAID FOR FROM KREWE ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP DUES - they receive NO funding from any other source! Each year Cap'n Billy is selected by secret ballot; he, in turn, chooses his Queen, First Mate and Mistress, ten-man Honor Guard and children of the court ... their identity a closely guarded secret.

Although the Krewe of Bowlegs is an all-male social club, their ladies are invited to join in most of the festivities. The late Docie Bass, Cap'n Billy Bowlegs IV, was the first to choose his Queen from the membership of the Krewe. Up until that time, queens had been "captive" wenches and beauty contest winners. Past queens belong to an organization known as the SOCIETY OF QUEENS. Among other things, they sponsor an annual punch party for graduating senior girls, daughters and/or granddaughters of Krewe members. These girls are presented at Cap'n Billy's court during the Coronation Pageant. In colorful costumes, they also assist the pirates during their annual raid on the city. Graduating senior daughters and sons of Krewe members also are invited to attend the Coronation Ball.

Last year, after many adventures on the high seas, Cap'n Billy, his motley Krewe and their loveable mascot, an alligator named "Mikey", anchored the BLACKHAWK in our own beautiful Emerald waters for a year of fun and frolic along the Miracle Strip ... perhaps with the ghosts of other pirates of that long ago cutlass-swinging, gold-plundering era!

... but now it's time to turn over command of the Krewe to a new Cap'n Billy, his Queen and court. We ask that you please settle back, get comfortable as we open the BLACKHAWK's Log to log another magical make believe journey to a Fantasyland of "let's pretend" ... climaxed by the unmasking of Cap'n Billy Bowlegs XXXIII!

He has been a member of the Krewe of Bowlegs for 19 years, serving on the executive board four terms and on the Honor Guard in 1980-81. He was First Mate in 1983-84.

He also is the grandfather of Jennifer, Victoria, and Thomas, children of Wade and Kathy Fallin who live in Jacksonville, where Wade is in the U.S. Navy. Cathi is a drafter in Palm Beach Shores. Cindy and her husband, Jerry Pergrim, both drafters, are employed locally. Daughter Dani, 15, has just completed her Sophomore year at Choctawhatchee High School where she was president of her class, a member of Wheelettes, Indianettes, Thalians, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, "Y" Club, and Mu Alpha Theta. Captain Billy's costume is silver brocade and white satin trimmed with emerald sequins and rhinestones. His cape of silver brocade lined with emerald green lamé features a large skull and crossbones, two shields, a Christian cross and the Fallin crest inside the shields. Green letters spell out his company's trademark at the lower center. The cape depicts his three priorities in life: Christianity, family, and profession.

artha Kilpatrick is a native of Jacksonville who later moved to Samson, Ala. She married W. Glenn Kilpatrick and after an Air Force assignment at Rhein Main, Germany and Eglin AFB, they returned to Fort Walton Beach where Glenn entered the banking profession.

The Kilpatricks later moved to Destin where Glenn is currently president and member of the board of directors of Destin Savings Bank.

Martha attended Auburn University and graduated cum laude from the University of West Florida in Pensacola. She is a former school teacher and licensed real estate salesperson.

Her recent activities include serving as president of the Destin Woman's Club, secretary of the Junior Service League, area chairperson for Okaloosa County United Way, and on the Destin Library board. She is a former Beta Sigma Phi Valentine Queen and American Cancer Society Heart Model of the Year. She enjoys reading, biking, water sports and modeling.

The train represents an Emerald Coast water scene showing fish, sea weed and a treasure chest filled with Billy Bowlegs gold coins and other jewels. The top of the train features a playful sea horse, Martha's favorite sea creature.

Other appearances for Cap'n Billy, his Queen and Court included the annual SPRINGTIME TALLAHASSEE celebration and parade; the FESTI-VAL OF THE RIVER sponsored by the Geneva, Alabama, River Rats; the SPANISH TRAIL FESTIVAL and parade in Crestview and the coronation ceremonies and ball of Los Caballeros de Espana; the FIESTA OF FIVE FLAGS in Pensacola, with separate appearances at the Krewe of Lafitte ball, the coronation of Don Tristan de Luna the 38th and the Mayoki Indian ball.

Perving as Cap'n Billy's right hand man is First Mate. HARRY BARR. A partner in the law firm of Chesser, Wingard, Barr, and Townsend, he has lived in Fort Walton Beach for 13 years.

The Lexington, Ky., native earned a B.S. degree in industrial engineering at the University of Alabama where he later received his Juris Doctorate in Law and was admitted to the Bar of both Florida and Alabama.

Before law school, he was a fighter pilot in the U.S. Air Force for six years, based at Hurlburt Field before serving in Vietnam as a forward air controller with the 25th Infantry.

His professional affiliation include the American Bar Association, the American Trial Lawyers Association, the Academy of Florida Trial Lawyers, and the Defense Research Institute. He has served on numerous state law committees and is on the Florida Bar Judicial Nominating Commission. Bob Brady is a Californian who earned a B.S. degree in science from Stanford University and a master's in electrical engineering from the Air Force Institute of Technology, Dayton, Ohio. Since he retired from the Air Force in 1976, he has been associated with McDonald Hamburgers.

He is president of the Okaloosa Soccer Booster Club that presented a pilot program to the School Board in 1980 which placed soccer in county high schools as a varsity sport.



He and his wife, Anniece, live in Poquito Bayou and have been residents of the Emerald Coast for 17 years.



William Augustus Bowles_

notorious old boy, so the legend goes, and patron pirate of the BILLY BOWLEGS FESTIVAL and the KREWE OF BOWLEGS, was born in 1763 on the Maryland frontier. When he was only 13, he joined the Loyalists Corps to fight against the American rebels. Two years later he was sent to Pensacola to join the British forces operating there. At the age of 16 he was commissioned an ensign in the British Navy ... after the war, he rebelled against military life and went into hiding with the Creek Indians after insulting a British officer (again, so the legend goes!). He married a tribeswoman, a chief's daugher, and in 1781 was welcomed back by the British to help battle the Spanish at Pensacola ... at that time, the British, Spanish and Americans were maneuvering for control of the Gulf shores and its shipping lanes. Believing himself destined to command instead of obeying orders, Bowles gathered a force of a "couple hundred plundering Indians, relics from the American Army and white banditti" ... a rolicking piratical crew which grew to be the concern of all three of the power-hungry countries. He created his own throne and the three nations considered everything from murder to a general's commission to get him on the right side. Financed by loot from a Spanish ship and surrounded by a handful of Indians. Cap'n Billy invaded British society for support. He was rewarded with a flag of "English and Indian colors mixed", a silver pipe, a tomahawk, a chain of friendship and trade supplies with which he formed the State of Muskogee. He was eventually captured by the Spanish and shipped to Madrid, Spain, and then to the Philippines, but he jumped ship and returned to his "state" and greater deeds of piracy...but all "good" pirates must have an end; and Cap'n Billy's came after he was lured to peace talks and there betrayed by his Indian troops. The Spanish imprisoned him in Cuba in the infamous Morro Castle - there, on December 23, 1805, he died. There are many reports as to how he died but whatever happened to Billy Bowlegs was not worth remembering to the people of that period, for he has no grave. To the Ft Walton Beach/Destin area, however, he left a heritage of pirate tales of great adventure and buried treasure!

Avast!

Of pirate ships and sailing ships and masted schooners four, of treasure chests and Spanish gold of pirate's lusty roar. Turn back the time to pirate days, those fearsome times of yore when Jolly Rogers sailed the seas a dreadful sight we're told! On moonlight nights by lantern light they crept upon the shore, and buried deep, while all did sleep their treasured coins of gold. So here's to pirates evermore those rascals of the seas. adventures now a memory they've left to you and me.
